Globally Competitive

LANGUAGE ARTS



Beechwood learners will read widely and deeply from a broad range of high quality, increasingly challenging literary and informational print and non-print texts and text sets from diverse cultures, time periods and disciplines, including all content areas. Through intentional scaffolding in which responsibility is gradually released, students will learn to activate schema, use cognitive strategies flexibly, acquire rich content knowledge and develop into independent and proficient lifelong learners. Learners will demonstrate competency of these standards in the context of authentic reading, writing, speaking and listening tasks.

Grade 8 learning will include, but is not limited to:

Literary and Informational Reading

■ Cite the strongest evidence to support analysis of a text, themes ■ Compose ARGUMENTS to support claims with clear and their development over a text, & analyze how elements of a story advance the plot or develop characters

- Analyze tone and meaning, compare/contrast text structures, and determine an author's perspective and purpose. Analyze how the author acknowledges and responds to conflicting evidence or viewpoints
- Analyze the extent to which a filmed/live production of a story or drama stays faithful to or departs from the text or script, evaluating choices made by the director or actors. Evaluate the advantages and disadvantages of using print and non-print formats for presenting particular topics or ideas
- Analyze a modern text and how it draws on literature from the past to create a new version
- Identify and evaluate the argument and specific claims in a text, assessing whether the reasoning is sound and the evidence is relevant and sufficient. Analyze two or more texts with conflicting information on the same topic

- reasons and relevant evidence
- Compose INFORMATIVE AND/OR EXPLANATORY TEXTS to examine a topic and convey ideas, concepts and information through the selection, organization and analysis of relevant content
- Use NARRATIVES strategically in other modes of writing, utilizing effective technique, well-chosen details and well-structured sequences for the intended purpose
- Produce clear and coherent writing in which the development, organization and style are appropriate to task, purpose and audience
- With some guidance, develop and strengthen writing as needed by planning, revising, editing, rewriting or trying a new approach, focusing on how well purpose and audience have been addressed

Language

- Explain the function of verbals (gerunds, participles, infinitives). Form and use verbs in the active and passive voice to achieve particular effects; Form and use verbs in the indicative, imperative, interrogative, conditional, and subjunctive mood; Recognize and correct inappropriate shifts in verb voice and mood
- Use punctuation (comma, ellipsis, dash) to indicate a pause or break; Use an ellipsis to indicate an omission
- Interpret figures of speech in context; Use the relationship between particular words to better understand each of the words; Distinguish among the connotations of words with similar definitions

MATH



Beechwood learners will make sense of problems and persevere in solving them, reason abstractly and quantitatively, construct viable arguments and critique the reasoning of others, model with mathematics, use appropriate tools strategically, attend to precision, look for and make use of structure, look for and express regularity in repeated reasoning.

Grade 8 learning will include, but is not limited to:

■ Irrational numbers and fractions, multi-step equations with radicals and exponents, graphing equations, slope, properties of numbers with interpretation of solutions, systems of linear equations, functions, transformations, Pythagorean Theorem, volume, probability and statistics

SCIENCE



Beechwood learners will ask questions and define problems, develop and use models, plan and carry out investigations, analyze and interpret data, use mathematical and computational thinking, construct explanations and define solutions, engage in argument from evidence, obtain, evaluate and communicate information and use scientific equipment safely.

Grade 8 learning will include, but is not limited to:

■ LIFE SCIENCE: Living organisms, cells, cell cycle, heredity and genetics, ecology, evolution and taxonomy

SOCIAL STUDIES



Beechwood learners will use the standards to explore the relationships and interactions among individuals and groups at local, state, national and international levels through the disciplines of civics, economics, geography and history and the inquiry practices of questioning, investigating, using evidence and communicating conclusions.

Grade 8 learning will include, but is not limited to:

- UNITED STATES HISTORY (1600-1877): The founding and development of the United States in the Colonial Era, Revolutionary Period, Early Republic, Westward Expansion, Civil War and Reconstruction
- The role of citizens in the U.S. political system, how regions of the United States specialized based on supply and demand due to their geographic locations, how global interconnections impacted culture, land use and trade, and the role of changing political, social and economic perspectives had on the lives of diverse groups of people

SEMINAR CORE CONCEPTS



8th Grade Seminar

Seminar in 8th grade takes the Seminar Core Concepts and applies them to a year-long study of multiple career fields. This study takes place using the same Seminar Challenge Process developed in 7th grade and the career topics mirror the Minors that students have an opportunity to take in High School. The idea of 8th grade Seminar is to give students an experience with each career field and allow them to work with a community partner to learn side-by-side with them so that they may choose an area or areas of specialization once they enroll in 9th grade. The year culminates with a project based on their 9th grade Minor choice.
